## HOW TO PREPARE A MANUSCRIPT

---

### **All contributions in the journal are**

Essays should be written in fluent English and not require further edits. Manuscripts should be double spaced throughout. A length of approximately **10,000 words (at least 6,000 words)** is preferred for an article, including references, footnotes, and approximately **1,500 words** for a book-review. The author's **name, affiliation, mailing address, email address**, as well as **the title of the manuscript** should appear on a separate **cover sheet**. An **abstract** of no more than 200 words, a list of about 6 keywords, a bibliography, and a **glossary** for the Romanized East Asian terms should accompany the paper. Please use footnotes rather than endnotes. An up-to-date curriculum vitae should also be sent with the manuscript.

### Citations

- 1) The preferred style of reference is parenthetical citation by author and date, followed by the page number. For example, (Svenson, 2012: 80).
- 2) In parenthetical citations, the surname of the author (or authors' surnames connected by "and" if there are two, or the first author's surname followed by "et al." if there are more than two), year of publication and page numbers should be given, e.g., (Turgo, 2011), (Frank and Theodore, 2010: 35-39), (Park et al., 2014: 118). If the name of the author is mentioned in the main text it may be omitted in the reference: "according to Cho Hoonhui (2013: 112)." For Korean authors include both personal name and surname in the references.
- 3) Where more than one work is cited, they should be placed with the earliest date first, for example, (Ordonez, 2009: 210; Barr, 2008; Moore, 2007: 125). If more than one work by the same author is cited, the name need not be repeated.

For example, (O'Neill, 2006, 2005a, 2005b; Um, 2004). If more than one author listed in the bibliography has the same surname, the full name should be cited to avoid confusion. For example, (Chen, 2003)

- 4) Footnotes should be kept to an absolute minimum and are reserved only for those explications that cannot be readily fit into the narrative text. Footnotes may contain parenthetical citations to other published works, with the full bibliographic entries appearing in the bibliography.
- 5) For the bibliography, please consult the online information for author-date references of the Chicago Manual of Style: [www.chicagomanualofstyle.org](http://www.chicagomanualofstyle.org).

## Romanization

KJCH uses the following systems of Romanization:

**Korean** - The **McCune-Reischauer** System is preferred.

**Japanese** - **Hepburn**

**Chinese** - The **Pinyin** system as found in the *Xiandai hanyu cidian* published by the institute of the Chinese Academy of Sciences (Beijing Shangwuyin Shuguan, 1978).
